The Annie Get Your Gun set was the source of the decor, Capab's Puppet Company provided the sound equipment and the Maritime Museum provided the venue.

Two schoolboys, Gerd Niehaus and Ryno Mulder, old hands in Nico Malan productions, were asked to give their services on the trapeze and well as juggling and riding unicycles.

Mathew Devine, the stiltwalker from Chiwele and the Giant will be a ring-master with a difference — on stilts.

Keith's son, Mark Allen, and Mo and Anilke Marais will be giving circus classes at the venue for children who are daring enough to try, while the Van Rensburgs and Gerickes will run their Dare to Dream venture started earlier this year at schools to teach children skills they never thought were possible.

And to make everything even more exciting, the best pupils will be invited to be guest stars in the show.
