Sports stars in grand show parade

THIS year's Rand Easter Show at Nasrec will be launched on Saturday, March 30, featuring athletes and sports people who will represent South Africa at both the Olympic Games and Paralympic Games in Atlanta later this year.

Following the parade, Tokyo Sexwale, the premier of Gauteng, will officially open the show in the main arena at about 12.30 by releasing thousands of balloons.

"With just three-and-a-half months to go before our SA Olympic athletes take on the world at the Atlanta Olympic Games, we and many others want to visibly demonstrate Gauteng's support of both the Olympic and Paralympic athletes," says Anton Post, managing director of the Rand Easter Show.

The parade and festivities during the opening ceremony are being made possible by Nedbank, in

its capacity as an official sponsor of both the SA Olympic and Paralympic teams, and are endorsed by the National Olympic Committee of South Africa (NOCSA) and the National Paralympic Committee of South Africa (NAPCOSA).

The parade will be led into the showgrounds by javelin star Philip Spies, who will fulfil the role of the traditional flame runner. He will be followed by 20 members of the SA Hockey team, 20 contenders for the National Paralympic team and a number of athletes participating in NOCSA's Operation Excellence Programme.

A procession of 40 magnificent vintage vehicles, driven by members of the Vintage and Veteran Association, will form the bulk of the cavalcade, along with horses and riders from the Soweto Equestrian Association and the Transvaal Horse Society.

The Johannesburg Orpheus Choral Society and the Copper Band Minstrels will add a festive touch of joyful song and dance to the parade.


HEAD for the centre esplanade at the National Exhibition Centre during the Rand Easter Show for daily action in which you can participate.
